# We see a community pulling together and pushing ahead

*A letter from our  
Executive Director and Board Chair*

Any reflection on the past year must begin with the remarkable grit and resolve our community has shown. For 32 years, Her Justice has stood with women who are braving impossible decisions. And yet, there is a real sense from our clients and among our experts that it is more difficult than ever before for survivors of gender-based violence living in precarity at the margins.

At Her Justice, we are clear-eyed about the challenges these remarkable women are up against: in their homes, in the streets, in the check-out line, and in our courts. **But we also see a community that's showing up alongside them: partners, supporters, volunteers, and staff who refuse to look away—and who insist that, if we keep working together, our city can be better and our neighbors safer.**

In FY 2025 Her Justice served nearly 4,000 women and children across the five boroughs who came to New York City from more than 100 countries. 93% of our clients were women of color, 87% were survivors of intimate partner violence, and 70% were mothers. We trained and mentored 1,642 volunteer attorneys, unlocking nearly \$55 million of free legal services from the private sector and investing it into the civil justice system.

**That's powerful. Because, in this moment, Her Justice's work is critically important.** In a year defined by turmoil, we've seen how quickly the ground can shift beneath our neighbors who are already on unsteady footing. Rapidly rising cost of living, shrinking safety nets, and legal processes thrown into chaos all make it harder for women to

leave abuse. But we know that our work—divorce settlements, child support, work authorization, and more—are tools that offer a layer of financial protection to survivors in this uncertain time. In this report, we'll share stories of clients who secured hard-earned wins this year, in the courtroom and beyond, thanks to the tireless work of their attorneys.

**This year we're also proud to have launched Report From Court,** a first-of-its-kind, real-time data collection project capturing how Family Court works—and fails to work—so that we can use this information to advocate for smart, practical reform. Driven by a simple question—*what was it like in court today?*—the insights we gather are designed to illuminate systemic patterns and point toward achievable change.

**All of this work is only possible because of you.** This was a year marked by extraordinary partnership and agility. And for that, we say thank you. To our community of firms, attorneys, partner organizations, and donors: your generosity is the reason our clients don't have to face their abusers, or an unjust system, alone. Together, we're pushing forward.

# What We Do

At Her Justice, we see a powerful role for the private sector in the pursuit of a city where New Yorkers can rely on the civil justice system to deliver fair outcomes in deeply intimate matters affecting their safety, livelihoods, and dignity—providing a foundation to grow strong families and healthy communities.

**That's why we connect volunteer lawyers from top firms with women and gender-diverse New Yorkers living in poverty**—almost all of them survivors of abuse or trafficking, many of them immigrants, and the vast majority mothers with complicated, interconnected legal needs—who have turned to the courts for safety and freedom. We have their back every step of the way.

**Our team of in-house legal experts partner closely with pro bono attorneys,** training them in a trauma-informed approach and mentoring them through each stage of a complex civil matter. And together, we see life-changing outcomes that ripple through generations. Thanks to our work, clients are freed from coerced debt as part of divorce proceedings. They're granted orders of protection and custody of their children. They receive work permits that allow them to provide for their families as they await final determinations of their legal status in the U.S. And so much more.

**As times become harder and ever more precarious for survivors, every legal win matters.** Each one reflects a community pulling together and pushing ahead. Our work gives our clients the footing they need to rebuild. To attain financial independence through steady employment, secure safe housing for their children, or pursue an education that was once out of reach—our work empowers women to create the fresh start they've fought for.

- Labor and sex trafficking



# Who We Serve

Our clients live, work, and parent in all five boroughs of New York City



**We equip professionals across sectors to better serve New Yorkers seeking civil justice.**

In FY 2025, we trained an additional 2,903 attorneys on topics such as trauma-informed lawyering, coercive control within intimate partner violence and how it shows up in courtrooms, and ethics and professional responsibility for new attorneys. We also reached 459 other professionals through 34 capacity-building events, working to ensure our systems run more smoothly and better serve clients.



# Justice In Action

## Stories Of Our Impact

Her Justice helped New Yorkers achieve life-changing outcomes in thousands of complex civil justice matters this year. Behind every legal win is a story of resilience, courage, and transformation. Here are just a few stories illustrating the power of what our community achieved together for clients.

**For Julie,** who came to New York for a clinical fellowship in speech pathology and lost her status while enduring years of abuse from her children's father, Her Justice navigated a complex, years-long immigration process to secure her work permit, green card, and ultimately U.S. citizenship.

**For Adela,** whose ex-partner lied to evade his child support obligations, Her Justice pursued relentless financial discovery. We ultimately convinced the court to rule that Adela's ex-partner had grossly under-reported his income and award her \$1,645 a month in child support—more than 65x the \$25 statutory default she would have otherwise gotten.

**For Ximena,** who was brought to the U.S. without documents and forced into sex work, Her Justice worked with the government to ensure her abuser was sentenced to 17+ years in prison and ordered to pay her \$3+ million in restitution for wages he stole and medical bills for the harm he inflicted.

# Advancing Our Policy Agenda

## From Lived Experience to Lasting Change

Our policy agenda is fueled by the lived experience of our clients. In FY 2025, Her Justice pursued 42 policy initiatives at the city, state, and federal levels to put power in the hands of women like our clients and create a civil justice system that works better for all of us. Here are just a few highlights from our work this year:

### Coerced Debt Reform

**New York shouldn't make survivors pay for their abuse**—that's why we worked in coalition to draft and pass the Coerced Debt Bill (S.1353-B/A.3038-B) through both houses of State legislature, and in December 2025, **Governor Hochul signed our bill!** This critical new law will allow survivors to get free from coerced debt, a common form of financial abuse, and let creditors pursue payment from the right person—abusers who accrued debt as a way of controlling their victims—so that survivors aren't left carrying the bill for their abuse.

### Child Support Reform

**We continued to advance an innovative Her Justice bill** (S.245/Persaud, A.3531/Reyes) that would create an expedited settlement process for parents who agree on child support—reducing Family Court backlogs and helping parents reach support orders faster. We amplified this advocacy through our participation in the Family Justice Initiative. We were thrilled when the New York Family Courts began piloting a triage process for parents at the early stages of child support litigation, reflecting growing momentum toward more efficient, family-centered approaches to child support.

### The Impact of Retaliatory Lawsuits

**We joined the national conversation** on the disturbing trend of attorneys bringing abusive DARVO (“Deny”, “Attack”, “Reverse Victim and Offender”) tactics into their litigation strategy via retaliatory lawsuits against survivors who have turned to the justice system. Most recently, we contributed to an amicus brief in the *Lively V. Wayfarer Studios LLC* lawsuit, which has garnered national coverage.

## Investments in Legal Services

Immigration has always been core to New York City's story, economy, and culture. That's why we joined the coalition calling for stronger investments in legal services supporting immigrant New Yorkers in our 2026 State Budget, including \$165 million in total funding to immigration legal services and enactment of both the Access to Representation Act and the Building Up Immigrant Legal Defense Act, which would fund and expand representation for immigrants facing deportation.

## Endorsing the WISE Act

We joined the coalition advocating for the **Working for Immigrant Safety and Empowerment (WISE) Act**, a federal law which would ensure that immigrant survivors of domestic violence, human trafficking, and gender-based violence have access to protections intended by the bipartisan Violence Against Women Act; the Trafficking Victims Protection Act; and other federal and state laws. The bill would also help ensure survivors pursuing relief are not detained or deported before their applications are fully adjudicated.

# Report From Court: Data tells a story

## What can data tell us about New York City Family Court?

There are approximately 125,000 filings each year in New York City Family Court. But most of us have no idea what goes on inside the courtroom. We do know that the system is under-resourced and overburdened—and there isn't enough publicly available data about what happens in court. That's where Report From Court comes in.

### ABOUT THE REPORT


In November 2024, Her Justice launched Report From Court—a data collection collaboration between our organization and the pro bono attorneys who represent Her Justice clients—guided by a single question: *What was it like in court today?*

**That's because, at Her Justice, we see the impact that being in court has on women's lives, even outside of the ultimate outcome of the case.** It matters if a woman has to take off time from work and arrange childcare only to have her case heard hours late or not at all. It matters if the judge has read the documents and asks questions. Family Court makes major decisions that impact families and children in our community. And while a chaotic appearance weighs heavily on a client's time and finances, a smooth one can make a night-and-day difference to her trust in the system and her path through it.

We believe that a family's security shouldn't depend on the idiosyncrasies of how a particular judge runs their court on any given day. And that's why we're tracking our clients' experiences through their lawyers' perspectives—so we can work towards improvements to our system hand-in-hand with the courts themselves.

### OUR GOAL?

**To fill the data gap so we can support solutions for reform through policy actions.**

### What was it like in court today?



“It was a very frustrating experience. Our case was adjourned after thirty minutes. The judge refused to give my client a temporary child support order because we were out of time. **Our next court date isn't for two months.** My client was understandably furious.”

“It was a productive, efficient appearance. **The referee made reasonable decisions** given challenging circumstances between the parties. It was also helpful for our client not to have to be in the same room as the adverse party.”



### Our lawyers answered.



“We were scheduled for a two-hour trial to determine a final order of child support, but the Support Magistrate scheduled another case at the same time. **We ended up getting twenty minutes before the court.** We will return in six months for another court appearance.”

In this moment—when long-standing immigration protections are being gutted and due process routinely denied—a particular kind of danger looms larger than ever for survivors of domestic violence and trafficking. Our Her Justice client shared with CBS News how leaving her abusive husband brought her face-to-face with the threat of deportation. **Immigration Practice Director Esther Limb** explains how abusers exploit immigration status to exert power and control—and how we're seeing a rise in this type of threat, fueled by anti-immigrant rhetoric and enforcement practices.

## Women's Rights Groups Celebrate New York ERA Passage— but fear “bodily autonomy under threat”

New Yorkers voted for Proposition 1, also known as the Equal Right Amendment (ERA), to protect abortion in their city in a victory for reproductive rights. amNewYork tapped local reproductive and women's rights experts, including **Her Justice Executive Director Lex Korberg**.

“Her Justice knows all too well what studies show: that pregnancy is a particularly vulnerable period for women in abusive relationships, with markedly increased risk of violence. And we have seen time and again how abusers exploit pregnancy to control their partners—through financial dependence, coercion, or isolation—**and the devastating consequences for women who become legally tethered to their abusers through childbirth.** These risks are even more acute for people of color and those living in poverty, who face compounding barriers to safety and healthcare due to systemic inequities.”


